



Juvenile and family court indicators 13% of the juvenile court caseload was the result of a drug offense in 2018 31% of child maltreatment reports in 2018 indicated that the child's primary caregiver(s) had a drug abuse problem 36% of the children entering foster care in 2018 were identified to have a primary caregiver with a drug abuse problem 2% children entering foster care in 2018 were identified to have a drug abuse problem 27079 infants in 45 US states were referred to CPS agencies as infants with prenatal substance exposure in 2018.
